

Message from the CEO

Based on the experience at Strathdon, UA is now undertaking detailed analysis of this model with the intent to roll out the HUR gym at its other therapy centres around Melbourne. It is innovations like this that will become a vitally important way for seniors to restore and maintain their wellbeing as they age.

The shop front, known as the Uniting AgeWell Community Hub, is also a new way forward for the organisation. It gives UA an important local profile and enables it to build a strong relationship with the community. You can read more about the Community Hub in this edition of DoveTale.

These are excellent developments and are representative of the creative thinking that will need to be applied in the future as UA faces the significant challenges from the aged care sector.

I would also like to highlight that the UA Board and Executive team have commenced planning for the 2017-2020 Strategic Plan. This process will be a significant body of work, which commenced with an all-day planning session with the Board and Executive team on October 15. Once completed, the Strategic Plan will provide UA with a clear framework and strategic direction for the coming three years.

Finally, I would like to sincerely thank Peter Folliot, who has provided wonderful leadership over the past three months in the role of Interim Executive Director, during which time he has worked with the Senior Executive Team to progress a number of key initiatives. On behalf of UA I wish him well in his new role with the Uniting Church, Synod of Victoria and Tasmania, as Interim General Manager Corporate and Finance Services of the new Uniting entity.

From small beginnings to big things

F rom humble beginnings in the back gardens of Uniting AgeWell in Geelong, the Kalkee Op Shop has gone on to become a major contributor to the Kalkee Community.

During National Op Shop Week in August, the Kalkee Op Shop celebrated 16 years of business and contributing to community and renovation projects at the Kalkee Community.

Kalkee Volunteer Coordinator Heather Burger says the op shop is an essential part of the Uniting AgeWell community in Geelong.

"Over the years it has contributed enough funds to purchase two mini buses for community outings, harps for palliative care and numerous renovation projects at the residential sites and Independent Living Units," she said.

Staffed entirely by volunteers, the Kalkee Op Shop has a fun family atmosphere with long term volunteers, some spending more hours in the store each week than an average office worker.

Geelong woman, Jann Brearley, has volunteered five-and-a-half days a week for the last nine years and oversees the day-to-day operations of the shop. Jann was recently recognised for her work with people undertaking community service at the shop and nominated for a Victorian Government Community Partnership Award.

"We welcome volunteers from all walks of life, from professionals, seniors and jobseekers to those undertaking community service," she said.

"Everyday is different and there's never a dull moment, with many volunteers staying even after they've completed their service period."

The Kalkee Op Shop is also a place for people in the community to come in and have a chat.

"For many who come in, we are the only people they talk to the entire day, so we try to provide them with a bit of companionship," Jann said.

"We sell clothes, kitchenware and small furniture items as well as act as lay counsellors, listening and chatting to our customers."

The Kalkee Op Shop is located at 50 Francis Street Belmont, with all funds going towards supporting Uniting AgeWell Kalkee Community projects.

Community Hub opens in Moonah

H obart seniors can now access a new one-stop-shop for information about aged care, with the opening of the Uniting AgeWell Community Hub.

Opened by Her Excellency Professor the Honourable Kate Warner, AM, Governor of Tasmania, on Tuesday, September 6, the Hub serves as a community resource connecting older people to the information and services they need to age well.

Her Excellency said the community often had predefined perceptions of aged care services and the Hub was a great space where people could access free information and advice.

Federal Labor Member for Franklin and Shadow Minister for Ageing and Mental Health, Julie Collins, Labor Senator for Tasmania Lisa Singh and members of the Hobart and Clarence City councils, also attended.

They were joined by Uniting AgeWell Deputy Board Chair Wendy Quinn, Interim Executive Director Peter Folliot, and members of the Senior Executive Team.

The Community Hub will facilitate:

- promotion and delivery of Home Care Packages
- awareness of UA services such as residential care, independent living, social support and respite
- community connection

Individuals will be able to attend information sessions, use an internet kiosk, receive support and training on how to access MyAgedCare, speak with staff about services available to support their needs and obtain brochures and information packs.

In giving we receive

n the harsh, cold Hobart winter, the generosity of Uniting AgeWell Ningana and Queenborough Rise communities brought warmth and comfort to the city's homeless.

Motorbikes from across Hobart roared into Ningana on July 3 for an inaugural Blanket Run, while avid knitters at Queenborough Rise had their needles working overtime, raising money and creating blankets for people in need.

Ningana Project Officer and event coordinator Ken Harriss said the Blanket Run was supported by the Military Brotherhood Motorcycle Club in Hobart, Mr Tony Mulder MLC and Greta Meat Works.

It collected hundreds of blankets and raised \$522.90 in donations for local charities to distribute to people in need.

"Our community felt it was important to help others because there are many people who have far less than we do," he said. "It's showing kindness to those in less fortunate situations than ours."

The day began with a hot breakfast, enabling residents and families to inspect the beautiful machines.

"It was an excellent community event with families and residents contributing to the initiative and one resident even taking the opportunity to ride on the back of a bike," Ken said.

Meanwhile, the 20-member knitting group at Queenborough Rise created individual squares from wool scraps that were later sewn together by a volunteer into more than 50 colourful blankets. They were then distributed between UnitingCare Tasmania, Colony 47 and the ABC Giving Tree.

Queenborough Rise Chaplain Marian Bisset said the idea started when she saw an ad on television appealing for blankets for those most vulnerable during winter.

"I suggested this to the knitting group, to which everyone enthusiastically agreed it was a great initiative," she said.

"One resident even commented how lucky they were to all have blankets and ought to make some to give to those less fortunate."

Members of the knitting group were delighted to take part in this act of kindness, giving life to the words of St Francis: "It is in giving we receive".

Officially opened by Reverend Sharon Hollis, Moderator of the Uniting Church in Australia, Synod of Victoria and Tasmania in June, the new wing is filling quickly.

Regional Admissions Officer, Kris Alexus, said the new wing had been received extremely well by the community.

"Residents, families and visitors love the natural light and attention to detail the new wing offers," he said.

"Since we opened, we've welcomed 19 new residents, with one or two people moving in every week."

Kris said residents in the new wing had settled in well and were forming close friendships, creating a whole new vibe at Manor Lakes.

"Many visitors who toured the facilities have commented on how friendly the atmosphere is," he said. UA Board Chair Allan Thompson said the new wing and redevelopment of Manor Lakes, which includes a community café, was part of the organisation's vision to provide high quality services for seniors in Victoria and Tasmania.

Allan said UA was building new state-of-the-art aged care residences at its sites in Preston and Hawthorn, with contemporary retirement living apartments part of the Hawthorn development.

He said UA was also doing much work to strengthen the services it provided to people in their own homes, whether it be assistance with daily activities and tasks or maintaining health, wellbeing and independence through day therapy and community centres.

"As an expression of the Church at work, we have a responsibility to meet the needs of our seniors and ensure all people can live to their potential," he said. \checkmark

Men's Shed provides tools to health and emotional wellbeing

W hile his wife receives physiotherapy after a stroke, James Tan is busily crafting her a hand-made wobble board at Hawthorn Centre's Men's Shed to help her regain her balance.

Despite having no woodwork experience, the retired IT consultant is enjoying learning new skills, being creative and developing comradery with the other Men's Shed members.

James said he started attending the Men's Shed when his wife Rosalind began receiving physiotherapy at the centre as part of her recovery program.

"I come from a really technical background and have never done woodwork before, so I wasn't sure what to expect when I signed up," he said.

"I now love it as it's a handy skill and allows me to be creative and make something useful."

James has also built a folding chair and other pieces of equipment to help with Rosalind's balance and recovery.

Uniting AgeWell has two Men's Sheds, at Rosetta Community, Strathaven in Hobart and Hawthorn Centre in Melbourne. The Strathaven Men's Shed is also open to residents from Strathaven and Strathglen as part of their weekly lifestyle program.

Hawthorn Men's Shed Project Officer Ian Fenton says Men's Sheds are places where men can develop friendships, pursue new activities, learn new skills or become involved in physical activities.

"Our Men's Sheds provide a safe and stimulating environment where men can remain active in mind and body, while developing old-fashioned mateship," he said.

About 50 locals, including Federal Kooyong MP Josh Frydenberg and Victorian Hawthorn MP John Pesutto attended an Open Day at the Hawthorn Men's Shed in June where they saw woodturning demonstrations and chatted with guests.

Strathdevon Community aged care expo

Seniors in north western Tasmania can learn more about Uniting AgeWell's community services at an Aged Care Expo at the Latrobe Community Strathdevon in November.

Government agencies and service providers including Centrelink, the Department of Health, Advocacy Tasmania and COTA will be on hand to answer queries about eligibility and the type of home care services available.

UA Strathdevon Community Programs Coordinator Peter Cullen said there were many senior service options available and it could be difficult to understand and navigate the aged care system. "We are holding the Expo to help people find out what's available, whether they're eligible for government-funded services, help them get referrals and register on My Aged Care," he said.

Home care services such as personal care, social support and assistance with domestic chores, gardening and technology enable seniors to remain independent in their own homes longer while remaining connected and an active part of the community.

The Expo will be held at Uniting AgeWell Strathdevon Community, 37 Moriarty Road, Latrobe on Friday, November 18 from 10am to 3pm.

Residents and guests celebrated with week-long activities, including hat making with a milliner and historical displays by the Footscray Historical Society, culminating with a Morning Tea extravaganza with the arrival of the Emirates Melbourne Cup Tour.

Kingsville Manager Integrated Services, Christine Harwood, said residents at both Kingsville and Amarco Apartments looked forward to the event weeks beforehand.

"Many residents began creating artwork and decorations as part of their lifestyle activities," she said.

"Local volunteers also visited to assist with creating decorations."

With many residents, clients and their families living most of their lives in the area, many have fond memories and stories of the Melbourne Cup.

Uniting AgeWell General Manager Victoria North West Vicky Jacques said the Tour was a wonderful community event where clients could get together and celebrate one of Australia's oldest sporting events.

"The event is an important way to acknowledge the significant contributions our residents and clients have made to the local area," she said.

Providing care to regional seniors

U niting AgeWell is significantly expanding its home care services across regional Victoria, taking over almost 300 packages across the Loddon Mallee and Gippsland regions.

In September the organisation took over 25 Level 2 Home Care Packages (HCPs) from Uniting Care Gippsland, following an agreement between the boards of the two organisations.

The packages complement the 15 Level 3 and 4 packages UA received as part of the Aged Care Approvals Round (ACAR) last year.

A number of Uniting Care Gippsland staff also transitioned to UA, providing continuity to the 25 home care clients. They will continue to be based in Bairnsdale.

At the start of October Uniting AgeWell announced it will take on 273 HCPs currently provided by the Swan Hill Rural City Council (SHRCC).

SHRCC resolved in July to absolve itself of the Approved Provider responsibility for Home Care Packages and identify a third party to continue provision of the services.

This was a result of Federal Government changes to the aged care industry in February 2017 that the SHRCC felt would make it difficult to continue in this role within the constraints of Local Government. UA was appointed the new Approved Provider after a comprehensive tender process.

Uniting AgeWell CEO Andrew Kinnersly said it was an exciting development for Uniting AgeWell, and significantly increased the number of HCPs the organisation delivered across regional and metropolitan Victoria and Tasmania.

"This latest announcement enhances the 70 packages we already deliver in the Loddon Mallee from our Strath-Haven Community Services team in Bendigo," he said.

Official transfer of the packages from SHRCC to Uniting AgeWell is now underway.

Andrew said a project manager had been appointed to oversee the transfer, and UA is undertaking regular consultations with SHRCC staff and service partners to ensure a smooth transition.

"While Uniting AgeWell will be the new provider of Home Care Packages in the Loddon Mallee region, there will be no change to the services clients in the region receive," he said.

"We remain committed to providing continuity and quality of services to clients, and maintaining partnerships with existing providers in the region."
